

**Only Physicians registered with the College of Physicians & Surgeons of Alberta may authorize cannabis for medical purposes in Alberta.** Applicable <u>Standards of Practice (SOP)</u> must be met when pursuing this activity, including but not limited to: <u>Cannabis for Medical Purposes SOP</u>; <u>Informed Consent SOP</u>; <u>Telemedicine SOP</u>; and <u>Prescribing: Drugs with Potential for Misuse or Diversion</u> <u>SOP</u>.

## STANDARD REQUIREMENTS - CHECKLIST FOR CANNABIS FOR MEDICAL PURPOSES SOP

## During initial assessment, including accepting transfer of care from another healthcare provider:

(	Other	conventional	therapies	were	tried	with	the	patient	but	found	to	be ineffecti	ve
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Patient risk of addiction was assessed using a standard addiction risk tool

Patient provided informed consent (in accordance with the <u>related standard of practice</u>)

Reviewed patient medication history & obtained a patient medication profile using prescription databases (e.g. Netcare/Pharmaceutical Information Network (PIN) and Triplicate Prescription Program (TPP))

## When authorizing medical cannabis:

Completed a Patient Medical Document

Provided a copy of the <u>Patient Medical Document</u> to CPSA within 7 days of completion

Checked compliance with federal regulations including Health Canada's <u>Information for Health Care</u> <u>Professionals</u>

## During stabilization and continuing long-term authorizations:

Reviewed patient medication history reviewed periodically & at least once every three months

At each reassessment, the continued benefits and risks of cannabis use were evaluated

 $\Box$  Ongoing care, for underlying condition for which cannabis was being used, was provided

NOTE:

- Alberta Physicians MAY NOT dispense cannabis to any patient or person OR apply to become a licensed producer.
- It is expected that any authorization for cannabis will be follow the evidence and sound clinical judgement.
- The rationale for the authorization <u>must be documented</u> within the patient record.
- Other professionals in the patient's circle of care should be notified of the authorization unless the patient expressly refuses (after understanding the risks to them from non-disclosure, such as serious drug interactions).
- CPSA discourages cannabis authorizations for pediatric patients based on evidence of harm to the developing brain and as per the position of the Canadian Pediatric society (see <u>Cannabis and Canada's</u> <u>children and youth</u>).
