Alberta Health released the Alberta Substance Use Surveillance System in December 2020. The online dashboard includes 14 tabs of searchable data related to substance use (beyond opioids). Data comes from a variety of sources, including the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner, the Pharmaceutical Information Network (Netcare), community organizations like those who distribute Naloxone, Alberta Health Services and treatment programs: <u>www.alberta.ca/substance-use-surveillance-data.aspx</u>





MD Snapshot-Prescribing Overview

MD Snapshot-Prescribing is a tool for self-reflection and education, with the dual purpose of increasing your prescribing awareness and supporting you in optimizing care for your patients.

The Prescribing Snapshot is your customized prescribing profile, generated using data for <u>TPP</u> <u>Alberta</u> monitored medications, received from Netcare's Pharmaceutical Information Network (PIN).

Broken down across two prescribing domains (opioids and benzodiazepine/Z-drugs), prescribing data is captured on dispensed daily doses, multiple prescribers and other high-risk measures. The **benchmarks** used in MD Snapshot-Prescribing are informed by guidelines, evidence of risk and best-practice recommendations.

In addition to your prescribing profile, additional resources are provided with your MD Snapshot-Prescribing. Supporting Materials accessible in the Analytics section of your Physician Portal include:

- The Analytics Manual
- Comparator Group information
- <u>FAQs</u>
- <u>Glossary of Terms</u>
- An OME/DDD reference

Claiming Continuing Medical Education (CME) Credits

MOC: Reviewing your Snapshot qualifies for non-certified CME credits under the RCPSC's "Assessment" category of credit. Visit <u>www.royalcollege.ca</u> and complete the following:

- 1. Select section 3 "Assessment Activities".
- 2. Select "Practice Assessment" from the drop down menu that will appear after Step 1.
- 3. Answer questions regarding the activity (focus, length of time spent, self-reflection considerations, etc.).
- 4. Submit.

Mainpro+: Members of the CFPC can claim Mainpro+ credits in one of two ways, by visiting <u>www.cfpc.ca</u>:

- 1. Claim non-certified credits under the CFPC "Assessment" category of credit.
- 2. Complete a Linking Learning Assessment Exercise for 5 Mainpro+ certified credits.

Example of a Linking Learning Assessment Exercise:





Select 5 or more patients and for each of them, ask yourself the following:

- 1. Is the therapy indicated and appropriate?
- 2. Are there safer pharmaceutical and/or non-pharmaceutical options available?
- 3. Can I further optimize prescribing for my patient?
